FOREWORD

The Selectmen do not have the time to see and talk with many of the people of the town, and so have written a few items which might be of interest to them.

This past year has been a successful one for the town. All departments have kept within their budgets except the highway department, which was handicapped by two large storms, one in the Spring and one in the Fall that did severe damage.

Appointment of town officers when there is a vacancy, Trustees of Trust Funds are appointed by the Selectmen for the remainder of the term. Selectmen are appointed by the remaining two, to serve until the next annual town meeting. Judges are appointed by the Governor and Council. Deputy Sheriffs are appointed by the County Sheriff.

T.R.A. This has been administered entirely by the State Highway Department, the last two years. The Selectmen could only recommend the portions of road to be reconstructed.

Contract between the town and New England College for rent of town buildings has not been renewed due to the fact that it was voted at the last town meeting to give the Academy Hall to the College and they did not need the town hall. The Town will miss the \$600 that it was receiving each year as rent, as this will have to be made up by taxes on property. Also, the College kept them insured in favor of the Town.

You may note that the article reading, "To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting" has been restored to the warrant this year. This was done in accordance with a resolution passed at the last Town meeting, when it was apparent that few people realized that this article is ambiguous and non essential.

In order that valid action may be taken under any article, it is required that the subject matter be stated, and nothing done at any meeting shall be valid unless the subject there is so stated (57.2). Thus, any action taken under such an article can have

no binding effect, but can be regarded only as an expression of opinion and has no more force than a resolution offered for consideration in the absence of an article.

Some action will have to be taken in the next few years regarding the town's sewage system. Most of the lines are becoming filled with roots. Several places have required cleaning out and relaying during the past few years, where the pipe was completely filled with roots. We feel that some study should be made of this problem and how it should be financed.

Damage happening in the use of highways. We quote the following from Chapter 105, Article 4, Revised laws of New Hampshire: "Towns shall not be liable for such damages happening upon state roads nor upon highways within their borders which are constructed or repaired in whole or in part by the State."

Printing of the Town Report. Bids are submitted to the Selectmen for the printing of the report, and usually the lowest bid is accepted.

 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges, repair or exchange of machinery.
 5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the Public Health, and raise money for the same.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise or appropriate to defray the expense of observing Memorial day.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will raise or appropriate for the support of the Tucker Free Library.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Fire Department.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for maintaining hydrant service for the ensuing year.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for street lighting for the ensuing year.

11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to prevent the spread of white pine blister.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to reinsure the Town Trucks.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Construction of Class V Roads.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Merrimack Valley Region Association.

16. To see what action the Town will take relative to maintaining a Town Dump, raise money for same, or take other action relative thereto.

17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.

18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Concord Hospital.

19. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by tax sale.

20. To see if the town will vote to accept a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to defray the Town's share of the cost thereof.

21. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue all portions of Road bypassed by the new road, on Rt. 114 between the second bridge and Warner line on Bradford road.

22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the installation of an air whistle.

23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a new grader.

24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

- Article 8. Voted that the fire engineers be authorized to investigate the cost of installing an air whistle for fire alarm and to report at the next town meeting.
- Article 11. Selectmen authorized to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 13. Selectmen authorized to reinsure the town's trucks and bulldozer.
- Article 19. Selectmen authorized to sell property acquired by tax sale after publicly advertising the sale in two (2) public places.

Article 22. Voted that the Town of Henniker deed to the Trustees of New England College the land and buildings known as the Henniker Academy, which property was deeded to the Town of Henniker by the Trustees of the Henniker Academy and accepted by the Town as a gift at the annual Town Meeting held March 12, 1929. In the event that New England College should cease to use the premises for instructional purposes the Trustees of New England College shall deed the property to the Town of Henniker.

Article 23. Voted that private driveways will be plowed by the town, for a fee, after the town roads have been plowed.

Article 24. Voted, by official ballot, to legalize the playing of Beano.

* * * *

Voted that the following resolutions be accepted and adopted:

1. Resolved: That the Selectmen are hereby instructed to add the following article to the town warrant for town meeting each year, making it the last article in said warrant; "To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting."
2. Resolved: That the Selectmen are hereby instructed to have printed in the town report each year a detailed statement showing the transactions made between the Town and New England College; said statement clearly showing the amount of rent being charged for each building rented, the amount which has been paid and the amount due the town, if any, at the close of the year. Be it further resolved: That a detailed statement also be included in this report showing the amount of insurance carried on each building rented or leased to the College; the name of the party paying the insurance premiums; the name of the party in whose favor the insurance policies are written; and the name of the party who is in possession of the insurance policies.

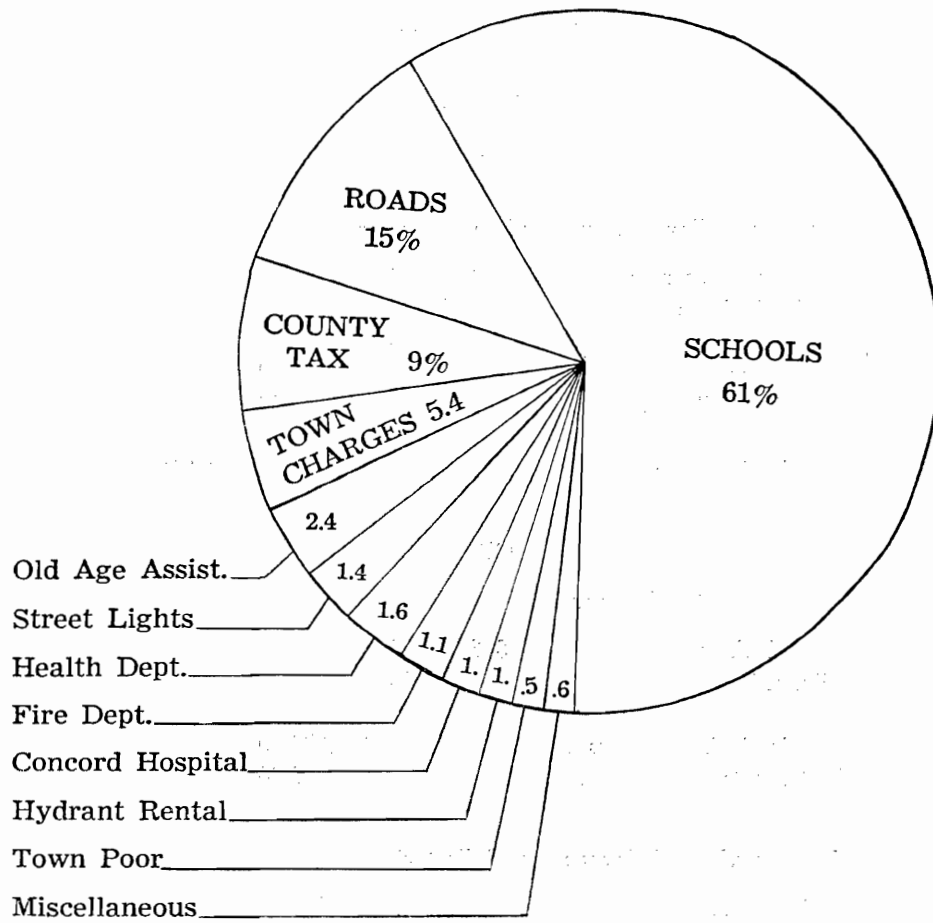

The last session of the General Court passed the Educational Bill which sets up a new State Aid to Educational Formula. In brief, a foundation program or the smallest amount any town should be paying for education is set up. This is estimated to be \$175.00 for every elementary school pupil and \$225.00 for every high school pupil. This foundation program is compared with the amount of money that could be raised by a 17 mill tax on the adjusted valuation. If the 17 mill tax would raise more money than the foundation, there will be no State Aid. If the 17 mill tax raises a smaller amount than the foundation program calls for, the state will pay the town the difference between the two amounts.

Using round numbers, Henniker's Foundation Program would cost \$46,800.00 and the 17 mill local fair share will raise \$42,000.00; which would mean that Henniker should get \$4,800.00 in State Aid. Because the State Legislature did not vote all the money to operate the formula, the towns will get only about 64 percent of the Foundation Aid. I believe the amount received by Henniker will be \$2,599.28 for this school year and the next school year.

This is a start but is still inadequate. Our tax base is still too narrow and the burden still falls heavily on the property owner. Until the case can be broadened, the property tax will still be the major source of income. In this problem, New Hampshire falls behind the other states.

There has been a complete change of teachers in the high school. Mr. John Economopoulou is the new Principal and Social Studies teacher; Miss Lois Charbono, Home Economics teacher; Mr. Clarence Gay, Practical Shop; Mrs. Marilyn Hayward, Science and Mathematics; Mr. Dwight Baker, Junior High and Coach; Mr. Charles Easton, English and French. The first four teachers are entirely new to Henniker. Mr. Baker served as practice teacher the last half of the year and Mr. Easton taught in Henniker several years ago.

Under the leadership of Mr. Economopoulos a very good start has been made and we have a well organized school. We have made several changes in the Program of Studies. Practical

Shop is being offered instead of Agriculture. Because we are not tied to federal regulations, we are able to gear the course entirely to the needs and interests of the students. I am quite sure that more boys should and will be taking the course next year. With the help of Mrs. Jameson, Mrs. Sanborn and Mrs. Easton a personal typing course is being offered. Mrs. Calclough is teaching an Art Course for the second year.

This is a fine thing that these women are willing to give their time but we can't expect them to continue indefinitely. There is still a need for another teacher. The teacher load is so heavy that they cannot do effective work. I am not personally interested in seeing if I can make things easier for the teachers, but I am interested in creating a situation that will help them do more efficient work. An extra teacher would also make the course of study much more flexible. It is impossible to arrange for a schedule of studies without conflicts with an inadequate staff of teachers.

I realize that this means more money and that the property tax will have to carry the burden. It is an expensive proposition to operate a high school for seventy children and have a rich program. With price indexes continuing to rise there seems to be no hope for a leveling off of school expense. There is no question but what some form of cooperative endeavor among the surrounding towns would be a possible answer.

In view of the rising costs and increased pupil population in the schools, I feel that a study should be made by a Committee composed of the professional staff, the Board and lay people. School meeting isn't the place to discuss this until enough people have the facts. The Committee should study the program as it is, decide what kind of schools they want and how to get them. Open meetings should be held to inform the people and then the decision made in school meeting.
